
Lymphoma screening

Thanks for bringing your pet in to see us. We performed a test that screens for a very common type of cancer, called lymphoma.

Test results: Negative

Your pet tested negative for lymphoma at this time. That's great news! Lymphoma screenings are recommended as part of annual wellness exams for dogs aged 7 and older and for at-risk breeds starting at age 4.



What does this mean?

Your pet is at an age or is a breed where cancer is more likely to occur.

A negative result for lymphoma doesn't rule out other forms of cancer. Your veterinarian might still recommend further testing.

It's important to screen your pet for lymphoma regularly, according to your veterinarian's recommendation.

What can I do next?

Just keep your pet happy and healthy, and speak with your veterinarian if you notice any of the following:

- + Unusual lumps and bumps
- + Sores or open wounds that don't heal
- + Weight loss or loss of appetite
- + Vomiting or diarrhea
- + Discharge or odor from the mouth, nose, or anus
- + Lack of interest in exercise and play or decrease in stamina
- + Mobility or stiffness issues
- + Difficulty breathing
- + Difficulty urinating or defecating
- + Any other concerns
